Titled "A Sufficient Number": The Historic African American Community of Peterborough in Warren, Maine," this thesis explores a relatively unknown community of African Americans living in a rural, coastal area of Maine from ca. 1790 to the 1950s. Using archaeological theory as well as social history, this thesis primarily focuses on the antebellum period of growth and development within the community, and explores the lack of understanding of communities of free African Americans outside of the institution of slavery.
